### **New Daylight**



### Is Your Church Dementia Friendly?

Society is much more aware of dementia and the impact that it has on individuals, families and friends and there are strong movements to ensure that our communities are or should become dementia friendly. This has been looked at in relation to the communities in which we live but Faith in Older People (FiOP) wants to ensure that this is particularly related to faith communities which play a vital part in the lives of many older people.

Generally congregations are welcoming to those who are experiencing dementia but FiOP wants to support them in further developing the way in which everyone is included and able to participate in worship, prayer and the social aspects of belonging to a faith community.

The aim of the FiOP project is to encourage people to talk about dementia and their understanding of what it is as it often feels a bit frightening and people become anxious about knowing what to do or say around those who have dementia. It want people to become aware of the issues and to think about the practical steps that could be taken; to raise the guestions that need to be answered and to overcome any fears about communicating; coping with the changes in an individual; enabling people to continue to contribute and

how it is affecting those who are caring for them.

FiOP wants to draw on the excellent work that has been done to date by a number of organisations and to bring it together to form a guide which will emulate the approach taken for ECO friendly congregations using an audit tool of bronze, silver and gold levels. This approach takes into account the capacity of the individuals within the community and the members of the congregation to respond to the identified needs.

FiOP can evolve the approach over time and would like to visit different congregations or hold seminars, and to share ideas so that people with dementia can remain within the church community enjoying the friendship, routines and rituals which have meant so much to them.

In collaboration with Methodist Homes, FiOP will be holding a conference on 23 November 2016 to discuss these elements. The keynote speaker will be Professor Elizabeth Mackinlay from Charles Sturt University, Australia, who has written extensively on the topic.

### **Easter Rising**

Fifty years ago I was walking down O'Connell Street in Dublin on the fiftieth anniversary of the Easter Rising. The flags were out, the IRA (a banned organisation in Eire) was booming out propaganda from street loudspeakers, and Nelson's Column had just been blown up. The Post Office still wore the bullet holes from the siege of 1916. I was a member of my college rugby team on tour in Northern Ireland and we had slipped down to Dublin for sightseeing. In the circumstances we kept our very British mouths shut.

Ireland was to the British as Judaea was to the Romans - a province with a tangled and turbulent history and a stiff-necked population, ready to take offence at a moment's notice. Of course, British policy towards Ireland down the ages, from Henry II and Cromwell to the Potato Famines, was clumsy and cruel. As in Judaea, Religion played a big part in the nationalist cause. In 1912 Asquith's government had finally passed a Bill for Home Rule. But the implementation of it was delayed by the threat of the Protestant Ulster Volunteer Force under Sir Edward Carson to take up arms in defence of Unionism, the mutiny of British officers at the Curragh who refused to march against Carson, and finally by the outbreak of the First World War.

Many Irishmen fought for Britain against Germany and few supported the hotheads of 1916. However, 500 people were killed in the fighting, most of them civilians who strayed into the line of fire. Fifteen ringleaders were executed by the British after a court martial and duly became martyrs to the cause. Maybe at another time the British might have been more circumspect but the war was going badly on the Western Front, German U boats were active in the Atlantic and there was a real fear that Germany might bring out Ireland in revolt. That year Sir Roger Casement was hanged for running German guns into Ireland.

After the war the Black and Tans attempted to crush resurgent Irish Nationalism. This was a nasty conflict with atrocities on both sides. In the end Michael Collins for the nationalists agreed to the partition of Ireland in return for independence within the British Empire. This cost him his life in the bitter civil war which followed.

In Judaea, the Romans tried Home Rule under Herod and Archelaus. Direct rule was imposed in AD 6, at the request of the Jews, because Archelaus' rule was harsh and repressive. Jesus was crucified under direct rule. Ten years later the Emperor Caligula ordered the erection of a statue to himself in the Temple at

Jerusalem, but he was murdered before it could be carried out. His successor Claudius gave the kingdom to his friend Agrippa I but after Agrippa's early death Judaea was taken back under direct rule. Roman procurators behaved tactlessly and discontent, fanned by famines, increased. Pseudo-messianic outbursts and brigandage were stirred up by the *Sicarii* (assassins), ultra-nationalists. In AD 66 what had amounted

to a civil war between them and the Jewish authorities became an open revolt against the Romans. Jerusalem was sacked four years later and the Temple destroyed. The Colosseum at Rome was built by Jewish prisoners of war.

Ireland and Judaea aptly illustrate the dangerous mixture of Politics and Religion. It is too easy to forget Christ's dictum 'My kingdom is not of this world'.

### **Nitekirk**

Nitekirk will take place on the first Sunday evening of April, May and June in St John's. It will be a space for reflection and prayer with an opportunity for some creative responses. This will include lighting candles, a piece of artwork to respond to and a quiet space.

It will take place from 6:00 to 8:00 pm and you are welcome to come and go at any time during the evening. If you have any questions, please ask

Graham or Gordon and Hazel Murch.

Sometimes, all that's needed is space.

In the midst of our full and rushing lives, it can be difficult to cultivate a sense of space. We don't give ourselves time to sit, to be still, and simply be. We fill our time and end up feeling cramped.

Nitekirk seeks to offer that space and stillness.

You might call it an open house - a place of welcome and refreshment. The church will be lit with candles, the atmosphere contemplative. There will be a time of reflection. gentle music and, throughout the sanctuary, places of activity - pictures to consider, Scripture, prayers and poems to read, something to feel with your hands, art supplies to focus your creativity. People come and go as they like, joining in songs and quiet conversations or sitting in silence and enjoying the space.

Each month, volunteers offer a theme which creates a framework for the evening. Often, these themes are grounded in everyday realities - Light, Turning, Closing, Water. The evening begins with a prayerful group reflection, inviting us each to explore the spiritual theme in a way that is personal.

Nitekirk offers something new. Usually, our experience of worship is quite structured, whether our church follows a set liturgy or a looser order of service. Nitekirk is different. Here, we are invited into an atmosphere of worship, but not instructed how we should respond. Instead, we trust that God is present among us and within us all. God will meet us - we simply accept the invitation and inhabit the space. This is a midwifery approach to the gospel.

We are invited to trust and know that our spirits are built for creative relationship with each other, with the world, and with God. Given space, worship and mission will emerge among us. We will find guidance, encouragement and strength for our journeys.

### Scottish Faiths Action for Refugees

News reports of teargas being used in Calais and on the Greek-FYROM border, with allegations of mistreatment of asylum seekers in Glasgow by the Home Office sub-contractor reminds us that the refugee crisis remains very real and also very close: how do societies and communities respond to human need and respect human dignity? In late 2015 several Scottish Churches and Faith Groups resolved to establish a refugee co-ordination project as a joint response to a growing humanitarian catastrophe.

The project is now underway, and is called Scottish Faiths Action for Refugee, cor-ordinated by David Bradwell. It is a joint faiths initiative, involving a number of Scottish Churches and the main representative Ecumenical, Jewish, Muslim and Interfaith groups.
