A Reflection on Luke 20: 27-38

Do you ever wonder what Heaven will be like? I have been thinking about this over the past few days with All Saints and All Souls. Isn't that the great question in today's reading?

The Sadducees were the oldest and most conservative of the major religious groups of Jesus' day. One of their big disagreements with the Pharisees and the other groups was over the fairly new notion that there would be a personal resurrection after death. The Sadducees denied this for a number of reasons. Today's Gospel mentions two of them. First: the resurrection was not attested in the Torah, the first five books of our Old Testament. Second: the resurrection didn't make sense. They said that you could not think about it clearly and that you could not understand it well enough to merit believing in it.

It is important to pay careful attention to what Jesus has to say in answer to the Sadducees, who asked him about the woman with seven husbands. This is one of the very few times Jesus does deal with direct questions on this matter.

His response is fascinating. He says that the woman in the story is not going to be anyone's wife. The question was silly because things will be different, and people will be different. He says that we will all be like angels – children of the resurrection. Is that a very satisfying answer? We don't know what angels are like, so we don't know what he means by saying we will be like angels. We don't know what it means to be children of the resurrection. The Sadducees came to Jesus with this great question and Jesus simply said that everything was going to be fine. We know no more about the resurrected life than we did before.

But this is central to our understanding of the resurrection, and of hope. Our hope does not come from knowing whose wife the woman will be. Our hope does not come from knowing any details of answers to the best and most reasonable of questions. Our hope comes from knowing Jesus, and our trust in the power and love of God. There is no other source of real, dynamic, living hope. There are no specifics. We are called simply to surrender our questions and difficulties and logical questions to trust in God, who will handle things better than we could imagine. God's love and care for us will surpass all that we can ask.

God's love has already carried us through so much and will not die, but grow. So the best way to prepare spiritually for our own death and for the life to come is not by taking harp lessons or trying to figure out the details of an afterlife, but rather to work on trusting God more and to practice letting go of ourselves. This doesn't answer the question posed by the Sadducees or our own questions. Instead, we are given an opportunity to trust and hope, which is greater than all our questions.




Eco Meets the Cost of Living Crisis

After the service September 18th, the Eco Group invited members of the congregation to share ideas to help reduce energy bills - both collectively and individually.

Very many thanks for all your suggestions – we were delighted by your positive response! Here they are:

- Plan meals to eat what is in season and sourced locally if possible.
- Don't bother peeling vegetables scrubbing is sufficient!



- Have a glass of water instead of a cup of tea or coffee.
- Recycle plastics, paper, glass etc.
- Read, or browse your laptop in the Library or Museum, rather than heat your own home.
- Swop books, rather than buy.
- Fit a strategically placed wall mirror to reduce the need for artificial light.
- Turn the thermostat down.
- Fill the kettle with only as much water as you need.
- Switch off the kettle as soon as you hear the first bubbling. Energy is wasted waiting for the automatic cut-off.
- Don't turn on an electric ring to full power straight away. Let it warm to half power first; then turn it up. It is the initial burst of power from cold that uses the most energy.
- Replace low energy light bulbs with LEDs.
- Use a Smart Meter sparingly to assess your appliances consumption.

Act justly, love mercy, walk humbly Micah 6:8

A recent newspaper article claimed that the proportion of young folk concerned about climate change is far higher than the percentage of older folk (baby boomers, like me!).

I trust that's not true at St John's! Christian Aid argues that their supporters are a real mix of generations. All are vital, each offering what they can to challenge need and injustice. Sometimes a signature, not pennies, is what Christian Aid seeks.

Such as the request to sign the *Loss and Damage* petition. After fierce argument, delegates at COP27 have just agreed to this petition. It calls for the creation of an international climate fund, to pay for damage caused by the climate crisis. The argument is that the people who have done the least to cause the crisis are the ones most affected – losing lives, harvests, land, homes, culture. In Pakistan monsoons destroyed thousands of homes and damaged four million acres of crops. East Africa is currently facing the worst drought in 40 years: a Malawian farmer said, '*We have no meat or milk; there is no water for our vegetables– we're losing many animals'*. The poorest countries, facing the gravest consequences, are now asking that those who caused the crisis should pay for the loss and damage they have caused. It is a justice issue.

Christian Aid is one of 60 civil society organisations within *Stop Climate Chaos Scotland (SCCS)* calling for the creation of an international climate fund, paid for by polluters and governments. Such a fund could begin to pay for some of the losses of the climate crisis, help people recover and rebuild when disasters strike, and compensate them for all that is permanently lost.

The only problem is, no such fund exists – yet!

So Christian Aid is asking its supporters to sign a petition to the PM requesting such a fund, and to ensure the money in the fund reaches the poorest, most vulnerable communities.

Diocesan Office Job Vacancies

With the planned retiral in Spring 2023 of the current Bishop's PA and Office Manager, the Diocesan Administration Board have advertised two vacancies in the Diocesan Office in Perth for a **Bishop's Secretary** and an **Office Manager**.

Both roles are 20 hours per week. Further details are on the Diocesan website (<u>www.standrews.anglican.org</u>) and the closing date for applications is 16th December 2022.



The Warm Spaces Scheme

Back in early September, as the implications of the cost of living crisis caused increasing concern, local councils across the UK started to draw up plans to allocate funds to provide community warm spaces, where those struggling with rising bills could find somewhere offering a bit of warmth and welcome. Pubs and clubs, libraries, churches and community centres of all sorts signed up to share their spaces at designated times. Perth and Kinross Council launched its own Cost of Living Community Fund *'for community groups and organisations who need financial support for community members across Perth & Kinross'*.

St. John's submitted an application offering a space in the Threshold on Wednesday afternoons from 1.30-3.30 in collaboration with the Bethany Christian Trust, which has been operating its Care Van in our car park free of charge for about six months, and which welcomed the possibility of being able to give its users somewhere to come in out of the cold in the winter months. Keeping it at its simplest, we based the application on the provision of free tea, coffee and biscuits or cake (all that Bethany Trust offers), an opportunity to charge the vital electronic devices, a place where they will find information on the other local sources of free food, advice services etc. - surprisingly many and varied - and perhaps a 'quiet table' where people can read, study or work, for an initial period of six months. We have received a grant of £700.

The project is in its early stages. Numbers using the Bethany van vary but average only about six to ten. As the scheme gets about, publicised by the Council, on our notice board and website, and winter bites, they may pick up. The question of volunteers to help with the kitchen, serving, washingup and locking up inevitably raises its head. I know we are all stretched as it is. At time of writing I'm not sure to what extent volunteer availability may be co-ordinated more centrally, either by the Council and/or PACT. Bethany usually has one or two volunteers of its own. And we might be able to share volunteering with the Cathedral. It's a potential vehicle for some genuine community outreach on St. John's part. We must give it a try for a few weeks. If it fails we can give the money back. If you're interested in being on a rota - even for one session in a month - let me have your name (at <u>mailme@kinnoullhill.co.uk</u>) and copy to Jean Hendry (at jeanhendry@hotmail.co.uk) meanwhile.


